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

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3456 MHz Isolator/Circulator

Used C-Band TVRO LNAs can be found at flea markets for less than 20 dollars. Some that don't work can be had for \$5.00. In the past I have shown how to modify these units for Amateur use on 3.4 GHz by removing the horn and attaching an SMA connector. The unit can also be used for a transmit amplifier. Usually defective units have a blown GaAsFET in the first stage, which is easily replaced by an NE720, MGF 1302 or equiv.

For units that are to be used for parts, ie: chip caps, GaAsFETs, bipolar transistors and trimmer caps, there is another application. Remove the pc board and disassemble the isolator. Cut the cast aluminum housing in half between the isolator and the pc board with a hacksaw. Then file the end of the unit flush. Mount an SMA for the input (Port 1) and an SMA for the output (Port 2). Use 2-56 screws to mount the connectors.

I found that the insertion loss (S21) and the return loss (S11) can be improved at 3456 MHz (below the design frequency 3.7-4.2 GHz) by adding a small magnet to the existing magnet. Move the magnet(s) around to "tune" the isolator.

The existing load at Port 3 will handle 250 mW or less. To use the unit as a circulator (3 ports), add a third connector in place of the load at port 3. A high power load can now be added.



Dear Al and Pack Rat Friends,

Last week I recieved your letter and the generous check in my father's memory. It takes about 2 weeks for mail to cross the world to us, but yours did arrive safely and I have sent the funds on to our Mission treasurer.

Now four and one half months have gone by since my Dad passed away, yet the realization sinks in only slowly. Remembrances of this man are with me often, and I continue to be helped by his spirit in much that I do. He was and always will be a Pack Rat in my mind's eye, for so many of my memories see him walking about, selling, or shooting the bull in the midst of all of you fellows. The companionship and the intellectual challenge of the club gave him immense enjoyment for many years. I like to think that he remains associated with the club to this day, even while he is in God's hands. I imagine that Mario and Frankie, Herr Stein and Doc, and perhaps even my friend Father Moran - all are within range of the repeater that Zed Dog is now keying up.

For many who remain here in this imperfect world, life is pretty rough. Nepal is a rugged land where walking is the principle means of travel and where most folks scrape out a living farming the sides of steep mountain slopes. Our mission has four hospitals here. Two of them lie 3 to 5 hours off of any motorable roads. I work in the hospital that is in the capital city of Kathmandu. In all four hospitals we see many patients who have come across the country on amazing journeys: carried in baskets, walking mountain trails while ill, embarking on day long bus journeys over the rutted, dusty roads. All of this is hard to comprehend when one is used to driving 5 minutes to visit the family doc; but it is the condition that many here find themselves in.

We see many folks who have easily treatable illness; young people whose lives are saved because simple antibiotics can be provided. But hospitals, even ones like ours which run on a shoestring budget, cost money to keep going. Sadly, many people stay home and suffer because they have heard that the hospital costs too much. 10 cents for an office visit; \$2.50 for a week of antibiotics; \$20 to be hospitalized for a week; \$50 for a major operation — and many can't afford even this. Here in Nepal you will find some of the poorest of the world's poor. We are able to care for them because people like you Pack Rats have generous hearts. Be assured that we will make that \$350 go a long way.

It is getting on to the heat of summer. This evening, as the crickets sing in the trees and the mosquitoes nip at the ankles, it is easy for me to imagine the White Elephant sale starting up outside the window. Sodas floating in tubs of ice, picking my way through the crowd, being stopped to chat by one person or another, the cloud of smoke hanging overhead, the loudspeaker baying out news of a sale. There will always be a warm place in my heart for you guys.

My Dad and I both thank you.
