

### 3456 MHz No-tune transverter Mod by Dave Mascaro, WA3JUF


The 3456 MHz no-tune transverter designed by WABNLC is an excellent design and has flooded the Microwave bands with activity. Many of the units work the first time they are fired up. Some of the units have instability problems associated with the output MMIC used, in particular the MSA-0885 (MAR-8).

The 0885 MMIC wants to be either driven harder with RF or turned on harder with DC. Since this is a linear amplifier stage, the former is not possible. Changing the supply voltage and/or the bias resistor will turn on the device harder, which seems to make it stable into a a  $50\Omega$  test set-up. When operated into an antenna or another amplifier stage, the MMIC will probably oscillate.

Usually replacing the bias resistor with a 1/2 watt carbon unit of slightly lower value will help with stability. Use the whole resistor lead as the RF choke to the MMIC.

Removing the MMIC and replacing it with a GaAsFET produces a stable amplifier with more output. The grounding rivets are removed and the ground pads are used as connection of the source leads of the FET. Two additional ground pads are added close to the source pads. I used three rivets close together to make the additional ground pads.

There is no room for additional output matching of the FET, but the gain is still greater than the 0885 MMIC. Power output will be 10-25 mW depending on the amount of local oscillator and gain of the other stages in the transmit chain. No instability was seen into a 3:1 mismatch at the output of the FET stage.



#### PROPAGATION REPORT By Paul Drexler, WB3JYO

Some good news to report this month! Don't forget to check out the bands during those mornings and evenings when rapid heating and/or cooling takes place. As the atmosphere fluctuates, tropo enhancement is likely to occur. The UHF contest comes at a time in the season when this phenomena is very common. Hope that you all had some tropo boost for the weekend. Let me know how propagation and activity were.

Propagation during the end of June included a fairly good 50 and 144 MHz aurora to New England on the 23rd, starting around 2300z and lasting more than an hour. Aurora signals were fairly weak for the propagation mode which I suspect explains why nothing was worked farther to the Northwest. On June 25, the 50 MHz band reportedly opened to Haiti (HH2) during the morning, and to the South and Southwest starting around 2000z. Several beacons from the South and SW were copied, including WB4AEG/B (EM74) on 50.066 and KB4UPI/B (EM73) on 50.073. Remember to look in the beacon portion of the band for an advance "heads up" alert to 6-meter openings. On June 31, 6-meters opened to Florida and Bermuda around 1500z with VP9IB running some tremendous pile-ups until the band finally closed several hours later.

Many were able to get in on an excellent 50 MHz coastal opening starting late in the evening on July 4 at 0100z. The fireworks included VELUT (FN65) and VEIMR (FN84), each having 20 over S9 signals and extending their communications as far south as North Carolina and west to Michigan. Although signals were extremely strong, the opening didn't materialize on 144 MHz.


Some locals are remarking that "the best E-skip in years" was into the Phila area on 2-meters for the evening of July 19. Apparently, Wl's and W2's worked out along the Gulf coast as far as Louisianna and deep into Florida. Were any Fack Rats in on this one? I'd appreciate any additional information from readers.

AFIT, equipped with gear for 2-meters, 2.3, 3.4, and 10 GHz, vacationed on the island of Martha's Vineyard during the week of July 15 through July 23. At the same time, 10 GHz enthusiast W2TTM was spending his vacation on the beach at Cape Hateras making a concerted daily effort to transmit beacon CW and listen for replies on 10.368 GHz. Also involved in the week-long experimenting were K2RIW (FN30), K2UYH (FN20), K2TXB, (FM29), and KlWHS (FN43). On July 20, AFIT worked K1WHS, K2UYH, K2TXB, K2RIW on 10 GHz and was hearing and tape recording the 10 watt WZTTM beacons from Hateras. On July 22, AFIT WORKED WZTTM with solid signals both ways as witnessed by those of us fortunate to be present on 144.260 and hear the play-by-play transmitted by AFIT. It is believed that this contact sets a new East Coast 10 GHz distance record. AFIT was running 10 mW to a small dish! K2RIW also worked WZFTM from his Long Island QTH and in then when all of the whoopin' and shoutin' was over, WC2K worked AFIT on 2.3 and 3.4 GHz for new grids. All QSO's were tape recorded by Dale, AFIT and he was planning to play it all back for the boys at the Central States Conference. W2TTM was equipped with only two bands - 40 meters for morning reporting and 10 GHz.

K3HZO is back on the bands with an entirely re-built antenna system and shack. He's active from Maryland (FM18) on 50 Mhz through 2.3 GHz including 2-meter EME. Look for Harry on our weekly nets and during openings and contests.
