PROPAGATION REPORT by Paul Drexler, WB3JYO

Not too much exciting happening on the bands these days, but if you've taken the time to make some noise or check on things periodically, chances are you probably found something to work.

On September 22nd, the higher bands were open to the West and then on the 28th the higher bands opened to the South. On October 6th KlGX/1 (_M96) was heard on 2 around 0025 GMT with an S3 signal. On October 9th s veral 4's were heard on 6 around 1245 GMT but conditions didn't improve much more than that.

On Monday morning, October 10th a good aurora was present through 2 meters with stations active from New England to the Northwest. Although the aurora was quite good for a solid hour, activity was rather sparse for a Columbus Day morning (not everyone gets off) grids FN03, FN65, EN70, and EN74 were active.

On the morning of the 16th 2 meter propagation was enhanced to the South and on the 17th during the evening good conditions existed to New England.

On the 23rd, Mike, N3BBI reports working grids EM82 and 83 on 6 around 1000 local time. Keep listenin' though, 10m is hot and F2 has been reported in other parts of the world.

REPORT ON THE MIDDLE ATLANTIC REPEATER COUNCIL MEETING (T-MARC) by Bob Cook, N2SB

This meeting was held on Sunday, October 16, in Savage, MD. The purpose was to come up with an alternate band plan for the 220 MHz band if we suffer a permanent loss of 220-222 MHz.

The meeting was sponsored by T-MARC and Bob Bennett, W3WCQ, was invited as the representative of the VHF-UHF Advisory Committee. There were also representatives of the weak-signal (CW-SSB-EME) community and FM repeater and packet radio communities.

A number of possible band plans were presented and discussed. The item that everyone planned for was to maintain the current 1.6 MHz split for repeaters and not have any repeaters go off the air due to lack of space on the band. This of course doesn't leave much band for the rest of the current users to divide up.

So, after much discussion, this is the 222 MHz band plan that came out of the meeting:

222.0 to 222.3 - CW, SSB, EME, Beacons

222.3 to 222.4 - Wide band packet or control

222.4 to 223.4 - FM repeater inputs

223.4 to 223.5 - Wide band packet

223.5 to 223.6 - FM simplex

223.6 to 223.7 - Wide band packet

223.7 to 224.0 - Links

224.0 to 224.9 - Repeater outputs

224.9 to 225.0 - Wide band packet

This is a tentative band plan and is subject to modification. It also is what the people at the meeting considered good for this area in the country and doesn't take into consideration other areas, i.e., California. Any comments you have can be brought up at the meetings at the library or directed to the VHF-UHF Advisory Committee.

The Rochester VHF Group is made up of serious! VHF/UHF/SHF weak signal CW, SSB enthusiasts.

A CARIBBEAN DX TRIP IN DECEMBER BY KA3B

During the month of December 1988 I will be travelling to the Turks & Caicos Islands (VP5) in the Caribbean. Although the main purpose of my trip is to be active for the ARRL 10 Meter Contest on the weekend of the 10th and 11th, I will be active on the 6 meter band as much as possible during my stay. I plan to arrive on the Island of Providenciales on the 8th of December and depart on the 13th. During the non-contest periods I will monitor 28.885 MHz for pending band openings. With this trip taking place in early December, it is hoped that contacts can be made by both F2 and E-skip as my operation will fall within the secondary E-skip season which peaks during this month.

At the present time I have Bob Cooper VP5D atempting to secure a VP5 callsign for me. If this can't be done, then I will sign as: VP5/KA3B. The grid square for Providenciales is FL 41. For anyone requesting a QSL card for my operation, I would recommend the direct route through the Call Book address. PLEASE, enclose a self-addressed stamped envelope (SASE) for a reply. QSL's for this operation will be available in late January or early February.

Although most 6 meter enthusiasts east of the Mississippi have worked and confirmed Turks & Caicos thanks to the activity of Bob Cooper VP5D, it is hoped that extended propagation on 50 MHz into the West Coast and Europe will provide a "new one" to those that haven't been fortunate enough to work this semi-rare location in the past. Bob VP5D is to be thanked ahead of time for his assistance and cooperation in getting this operation off the ground.

FREEDOM MARCH

Hams in Omaha, Nebraska are calling on amateurs nationwide to join with them in protest marches planned for Sunday, November 27th, Thanksqiving weekend.

According to John Gebuhr, WBØCMC, one of the march organizers, the march will demonstrate the anger of radio amateurs over the decision of the FCC to reallocate 220 - 222 MHz to land mobile business interests.

Gebuhr says the Omaha demonstration will take place in front of the federa court building, but urges hams to protest in front of FCC facilities in front of FCC facilities in those cities that have them.

WBØCMC notes that hams living near Washington, DC are in a unique position to get their message across to the public. He adds that television news organizations are always pressed to find newsworthy stories on this particular weekend.

It is interesting to note that this protest is not originating in one of the areas where the 220 band is most heavily crowded, but in a part of the nation where the rapid growth on the band is just beginning.

US AMATEURS SET MICROWAVE RECORDS

Records were recently set by US amateurs on three microwave bands.

Moonbounce at 10GHz has long been the dream when EME enthusiasts let
their imaginations run wild. It is a dream no longer, thanks to the pioneering
work of WA5VJB, KF5N, WA7CJO and KY7B.

On August 27, the four managed a contact between a station set up at WA5VJB's QTH near Dallas and that of WA7CJO in the Phoenix area. At the Texas end, 55 watts from a TWT (traveling wave tube) provided the RF to a 12-foot dish with a receiver noise figure of 2.1 dB. At the western end of the circuit, a 16-foot dish and a TWT delivering 90 W was used with a receiver noise figure of 1.5 dB. During the week rain hampered their attempts. Due to water absorption a 3 cm, rain and even clouds result in significant attenuation In addition signal spreading, apparently due to moon roughness, and 20 kHz of Doppler Shift contributed to the challenge. Both groups were able to hear moon noise which aided in knowing that they were pointed correctly.

Congratulations are certainly in order to this group for a difficult job

well done in accomplishing the first 10-GHz EME QSO.

The second record-breaking contact occurred on 47 GHz. Terrestrial communications at 47 GHz are not an easy feat to master, especially when attempting to attain distances greater than a few miles. However, on August 6, 1988, microwave enthusiast WA3RMX/7 and the gang at the Tektronix Employees Radio Amateur Club of Beaverton, Oregon (call sign K7AUO) made long distance communication on this band seem easy. On 47.040025 GHz at 2145 UTC that day, using 3.5 mW and 28.5 inch dishes on both ends, the group made a 65.37 mile (105 km) QSO on SSB with signals averaging S3 (after the clouds lifted, signals becoming even stronger). For this contact both stations were located in grid square CN82.

As with 10 GHz, moisture content in the atmosphere greatly affects communications on these high microwave bands. Attenuation at these frequencies is very severe and becomes even worse with clouds present. Clear skies and low humidity allow the greatest distances to be achieved.

Congratulations to WA3RMX/7 and the Tektronix gang K7AUO for their accomplishment of what should prove to be both a new United States and world distance record at 47 GHz.

It has been a couple of years since the last 3456 MHz record was set, but that doesn't mean that amateurs have been dormant on the band. Recently a new US record was set on the morning of August 7, 1988, between KXØO (located on Pikes Peak) in Colorado and WB5AFY in Northern Texas. This contact of 454 miles (730 km) shatters the old North American record of 288 miles set in 1986. KXØO was using 13.5 W into a 29-inch dish, while WB5AFY used 250 W and a 6-foot dish.

On August 6, KXØO worked WB5ULA on 902 MHz for a distance of 615.2 miles (990 km)-8 miles short of the 623 mile US and world distance record set by WB5ULA (Texas) and W4ODW (Florida) on March 22, 1988.

You can be certain that all microwave operators, and especially the above-mentioned enthusiasts, will be attempting to create new records. Microwave activity in the US is alive and well!


TNX ARRL Letter

ALUMINUM SOLDERING


You can solder aluminum! At the location you plan to solder on the aluminum place a drop of motor oil. Next take a sharp pointed tool and thoroughly scratch up the surface. Do not wipe off the oil. Now take your soldering iron, heat the spot and apply a good rosin core solder. You will find the solder will adhere completely - both physically and electrically. Works great for making connection to aluminum chassis. Try it.

2-Way 2304/2160 MHz Power divider




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- R1 $-50~\Omega$ microstrip type termination

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
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
