LOOKING FOR A FEW GOOD MEN

An Editorial by Rick Connor, WB2NPE

Who would believe that the Mt. Airy VHF Club is anything but a healthy, aspiring organization as we charge into the 1987 calender of events? The Pack Rats have set the pace for the East Coast in the areas of technical development and operating achievements; our members are known throughout the world, published in the leading handbooks, technical journals, and VHF/UHF newsletters across the country. We are a group of dedicated hams who have the almost unique goal of developing clean signals, high performance communications systems, and considerate operating practices in a day when these objectives have fallen to selfishness, sloppiness, and ignorance, in the radio world which surrounds us. We're a club that takes its matters seriously and at the same time is filled with comradery and friendship both among members and toward the amateur community. We are blessed with years of tradition, a firm foundation, and a continuing purpose. We are a club garnished with the gavels of victory, fat with the earnings of an ever-successful hamfest, thick in technical expertise, and generous with its ability and talent. What possible obstacle could stand before the Pack Rats?

The Mt. Airy VHF Club is indeed with a problem. We are plagued with a hidden disease, a sort of "walking pnewmonia". We feel pretty good, look fairly well, but deep inside a serious void is developing. We have no new blood. Yes, we suffer from the same problem that every ham organization is stumped with today - the lack of interest toward the hobby and our club by enthusiastic young people. The unfortunate part of this story is that those whom we seek are present in front of us. The VHF/UHF bands are filled with folks who are finding the same attraction in this end of the spectrum which seduced us at one point in our career. Some of these newcomers are young, others are old and all have that high level of interest and commitment that should be a part of the Pack Rats. Many are uncommitted, looking and asking for help from an organization such as ours. I have discovered guys on the air in the process of prodding construction projects built from designs originating from our members. I have come upon conversations on two meters where the subject has been the mystique of the Pack Rats and their desire to get involved Certainly, the market exists whereby we may recruit new, quality members into onto our rolls. Fortunately, we don't have to hit the streets and campaign to win the interest of these folks. We do have a mechanism which many general interest ham clubs don't have access to. That tool is the ability of a concentrated effort by our operators on the frequencies of mutual interest - the VHF/UHF bands. Where multi-interest groups find themselves so diversified that an effort in recruiting is weakened by the many different habits of the members, we have the ability to assault the bands on which we all dwell and collect the interested parties. The answer to our problem is our own ACTIVITY. club gets good PR and interaction through the activity nets on Monday evenings, however, the individual attention which the prospective members are seeking is best performed through the good old rag-chew QSO. If each of our members were to devote an hour or so of operating on their favority band on its particular activity night during the week, I believe we could produce some interest. Even some of the member-to-member communications which take place routinely on the club repeater could be done on 144,220, or 432 SSB and have a far greater potential in involving new people with common interests. It is my desire that Pack Rats keep this situation in mind throughout 1987. Invite those interested to a club meeting; hey! we always have leftover doughnuts and coffee!

And keep in mind that we're by no means looking to flood our ranks with un-desirables or pompous individuals who could spoil the reputation and traditions of the organization. I know from my experience that Pack Rat type VHF/UHF operators are available for recruitment. "WE'RE LOOKING FOR A FEW GOOD MEN".







Subject: Opportunities in the Field Organization

Members of your club are invited to become part of the future: to work with and for your Amateur family here in Eastern PA.

The January 1987 QST tells how to "Join Amateur Radio's Action-Team" in a short article starting on page 46. You don't have to be an old-timer to volunteer in the ARRL Field Organization in Eastern Pennsylvania. There are no age limits. Some appointments can even be held by Novices.

Though we welcome interest in all Field Organization appointments, I'd like to highlight a few areas we're especially trying to build up now.

The Public Information Assistant tells the local population about Amateur Radio: who we are, how we benefit the community, and how they can become hams. Your club's publicity chairman is probably already doing a PIA's work. We'd like to give him or her additional sources of literature and information from ARRL. Novices can be a PIA.

The Assistant Technical Coordinator doesn't have to be a technical genius, just interested in one or more technical subjects (packet radio, antennas, RFI, etc.) and willing to help others in the local area. Your club's technical committee probably already qualify. We'd like to add them to our roster. ATC's should hold a Tech or higher license.

Finally, your club's on-the-air bulletin station can gain from becoming an Offical Bulletin Station. As a former club bulletin station, I know it can be hard to find information. Holding an OBS appointment makes it easier. We are also looking for a Bulletin Manager for the whole Section, so we can serve our OBS's better. The Bulletin Manager and OBS's should hold a Tech or higher license.


All Field Organization appointments require current ARRL membership.


