

TIMING CYCLE OF SPORADIC E IONIZATION AT 144MHC

ABSTRACT

The relationship between Sporadic E ionization at 144 Mhz for the years 1976-1984 was superposed over the Interplanetary Magnetic Sector Boundary Crossing dates and the U.S. Lightning Index study by Lethbridge for the years of 1956-1976. A well defined timing cycle was found for the months of June and July of each year.

- 1. The theory of Watson (1928) and supported by the work of Holzer (1973) showed there is a clear correlation between solar influences and atmospheric electricity as described in the ionosphere-earth capacitor theory. Then within the dielectric, a thunderstorm is the most likely electrical generator. Sporadic E ionization at 144 Mhz supports communications paths at distances over 1000 miles on a frequency band that doesn't normally support long distance communications. The studies of Jim Stewart, WA4MVI, in 1976-1978, using FAA weather maps found a geographical pattern of thunderstorm activity that was located between the communicating radio stations. It is interesting to note that during this type of ionization, signal strength readings were within a few decibels even though participating stations has radiated power levels of less that 100 watts to over 50KW ERP. This ionization called by Amateur Radio Operators an "E cloud", adds credibility to the theory that there is some link between thunderstorm activity and ionization above the storm at the E layer. It may be possible in the future to calculate the geographical size and levels of ionization at the time of a thunderstorm using some type of modified radio path loss formula.
- 2. It was not within the scope of this study to find the physical link between thunderstorms and sporadic E vhf contacts. The intent of this historical study was to identify E Skip events and look for any repeating patterns that would enable the Radio Amateur Operator to predict with some degree of accuracy times when E Skip contacts were possible.
- 3. Using the MSB date and the superposed epoch study by Markson (1971) of toward/away sectors over the lightning index. Twenty seven sporadic E events for the month of June (1976-1983) were superposed over his findings. The results showed a peak of 7 E Skip events on day 1 from the MSB which corresponds with the lightning peak found at the start of a toward sector. Day 2 and 3 had 3 and 2 events. Day 4 showed 8 events matching the normalized lightning peak at day 4 1/2. Days 4 and 5 only showed 2 events each. Day 7 had five E events matching the peak in the lightning index found in the away sector. The July study gave different results and this difference may be caused by the timing of the semi-annual variation.
- 4. The same overlay was done for the month of July (1976-1983) using 30 Sporadic E openings and a well defined timing cycle was noted.

5. When superposing both June and July (1976-1983) with a total of 57 E opening events the results showed a major peak at day 4 following a pattern similar to the one noted by Lethbridge (1982) on her study of Superbolts and cosmic rays.

6. The study was then extended to long distance tropospheric radio contacts by using the studies by Roberts and Olson (1973b) on winter troughs and Svalgaard (1973) on the variation of height differences on pressure surfaces. The study covered the full years of 1976-1983 using 87 Tropospheric radio events. A high percentage of tropo events were found at day 0-1 and 4-5 from the MSB crossing. In the away sector ,13 events were noted at crossing time and in the toward sector 20, events on days 4-5. The 13 events in the away sector may be caused by a low VAI and in the toward sector caused by a high VAI.

SUMMARY

Since Sporadic E radio communications occur less than a dozen times in a given year on 144 Mhz it may be possible to set up schedules. Set new North America distance records and supply the scientific community data on these E events since it may be a valuable element in finding the physical link between solar activity, our ionosphere and meteorological events.

The Foundation composed of fifty local area amateur radio clubs, fully funds two of these scholarships from the proceeds of its annual Hamfest. It administers without cost to the donors, seven (7) scholarships for the Quarter Century Wireless Association, two (2) for the Dade (FL) Radio Club and one (1) each for the Radio Club of America, the Richard G. Chichester Memorial, the Young Ladies' Radio League, the Edmund G. Redington Memorial, the Amateur Radio News Service, the Columbia (MD) Amateur Radio Association, the Baltimore (MD) Amateur Radio Club and the Lewis W. Wilkinson Memorial.

Locensed Radio Amateurs may compete for one or more of these awards if they plan to pursue a full-time course of studies beyond high school and are enrolled or have been accepted for enrollment in an accredited university, college or technical school. Most of the scholarships require the applicant to hold at least an FCC General Class license or equivalent. The scholarship awards range from \$350 to \$900 with preference given in some cases to residents of specified geographical areas or the pursuit of certain study programs.

40 Watt 432 Mhz. Linear Amplifier by Dave Mascaro, WA3JUF

This amplifier uses microstrip circuitry on standard 1/16" G-10 double sided PC board. With the full scale artwork provided, the board can be reproduced using Exacto-etch or a ruby can be made. Rivets or pcs. of wire are used at all rf and dc grounds as indicated by holes in the artwork. The input and output connections must also be well grounded.

A hole is cut in the board to accept the 1/2" JØ device. The flange is screwed to a suitable heatsink with 4-40 screws with heatsink


compound used between the flange and the heatsink.


The four 27.pf Unelco capacitors are soldered to the PC board under each of the four emitters of Q1. Solder the emitters close to the cap of Q1 to reduce the inductance of the emitter leads.


The bias is turned on during transmit only. Icq is set at 100-150ma. The bias diode is soldered to a solder lug and mounted under one of the screws holding Q1 to the heatsink. The heatsink is around 3-1/2 X 5" with 1" high fins.


