

FROM THE EVENING BULLETIN FRIDAY APRIL 17, 1981 Stanley Umin, Electronics Engineer

Stanley Umin, an electronics engineer, died Wed. in Lower Bucks Hospital. He was 51 and lived at 224 Park Ave., West Bristol.

Mr. Umin was owner of Umin Electronics, an electronics service firm with branches in West Bristol and at 600 Porter St., South Phila. He also was inventor of the Umin Eye, a patented radiation detector used on television sets.

He was on the board of directors of the Delaware Valley Computer Club and a member of the Pack Rats, an amateur ham-radio club. A past commander of Flotilla No. 13-02 of the Coast Guard Auxillary, Mr. Umin also was a member of the Leonard Forman Lodge No. 782 F&AM and the George Washington Consistory.

He is survived by his wife, the former Frances Terlitzky; a son, Harry; two daughters, Cheryl and Lynn; a brother and a sister.

"PLAIN LANGUAGE" FCC Amateur Service Rules - A Quick Overview By Jim Holt, N3AHI

On December 19, 1980, the FCC released it's proposed "Plain Language" rewrite of the Rules & Regulations pertaining to the Amateur Radio Service, publishing same in the Federal Register. Somehow, (don't ask), W3CL obtained a copy and asked me to read it over for comment in Cheesebits (exclusively, I might add). Having done so, the long & the short of it is - not bad! But, don't stop reading because there are some items you should be very much aware of, should this document be adopted this Summer without substantial change.

First, the good news: Surprisingly, with only a few exceptions, each section is very understandable, Further, the FCC proposes as a part of this package, to completely eliminate logging requirements (certainly, logging is nonetheless a good practice, but would become optional with you, the licensee).

Now, the bad news: Charlie will require that each of us has on file at our stations a current copy of the rules at all times (I gather from this that they are going into the magazine business). Additionally, we'll have to keep and maintain a permanent file containing the following: 1. A copy of each letter sent the FCC telling them of an address change. 2: Your license. 3. A copy of each answer to an FCC discrepancy notification.

4. Each written permission you receive from the FCC (STA's & such). 5. A copy of any other correspondence to or from the FCC. There are additional file requirements if you operate a repeater...(isn't that just great, Ron?) The FCC staff would have the right to inspect your station at any reasonable time. (They define reasonable as the normal business day or any time your station is transmitting or just finished transmitting!) No Warrents or other legal documents would be required...if you're a bad guy or under scrutiny as a possible bad guy, they could come in and check you out while that shack mounted heat source is still glowing. Lastly, the subsection on permitted antenna heights is murkier than the present regulations, and obviously (at least to me), will need rework.

Once again, I am impressed that overall, the Staff has done a commendable job. The proposed new rules are easier to understand. As you might imagine, the ARRL is watching the proposal closely, having read it word for word and providing inputs to the FCC where clarification is needed - be sure to watch QST for further developments. However, it's my opinion that this document will be adopted without major change. In that event, get your checkbooks open guys, Charlie will soon require your subscription to their new Ham magazine "Part 97" - no exceptions.

MODIFICATIONS OF INTEREST TO IC-551/55ID USERS MARS OPERATION WITH THE IC-551/55ID

The following modification will allow additional operation between 49-50 Mhz with the ICOM IC-551/551D. Refer for figure 1, PLL unit drawing, and comments below and carefully perform the modification.

ICOM AMERICA, INC. ASSUMES NO LIABILITY FOR DAMAGE CAUSED BY OR WHILE INSTALLING THIS MOD.

- 1. Remove cover from PLL unit.
- 2. Locate R-5 in PLL (See Fig. 1) and cut the top wire.
- 3. Insert a 4.7K ohm 1/4 watt resistor in series with the cut leads of R-5. An alternate to this is to replace R-5 with a 4.7K ohm resistor.
- 4. Run a wire from pin 11 of IC-1 (See Fig 1) to a user installed SPST switch. (Location of switch is up to individual but should be located so that wiring is away from transmit RF circuitry.)
- 5. Wire from the other side of the SPST user installed switch to ground.

When the user installed switch is open, the radio will function normally. When the switch is closed, the radio will operate from 49-50 MHz when the display reads 50-51 MHz.

MORE IMPROVEMENTS FOR THE PACK-RAT 2 METER TRANSVERTER


Receiver Converter: L3 - move tap to 1 turn from ground end.

PR2 - change 47K resistor from G2 to ground to a 6.8K

This reduces IF gain and reduces overload from strong signals.

Local Oscillator- 38 MHZ version: Disconnect output of L7 and tap it about 4 turns from ground end. You may need 20pf more across the oscillator coil to make it tune.

> Change circuit of both PR4 and PR5 to look like below. Makes both Class "C" stages.



The FM station you may hear around 28.750 MHZ is Channel 6 Sound at 87.75 MHZ on the image of the receiver. An input filter or trap will probably eliminate it.

MODIFICATIONS OF INTEREST TO IC-551/551D USERS

ICOM AMERICA. INC.

Dear Mr. Wightman:

The noise blanker in the IC-551D is a different noise blanker from that provided in other ICOM radios.

It utilizes a one shot vibrator, designated as IC8 on the schematic diagram. The output pulse width of this multiple vibrator may be controlled by increasing the value of R71. Our experience has shown that a small potentiometer of approximately 50K would provide sufficient range to lengthen the pulse to a value that will provide additional blanking.

Please be advised, however, that too much width will cause distortion of the received audio.

Thank you very much for using ICOM. Let me know if I can be of assistance.

After serious discussion and the views of each Ham present taken into consideration, the following principles were adopted.

- 1. Membership shall be by invitation only, and a limit to be set.
- To qualify for membership a Ham must be active on the VHF bands, 2 meters and up. 2.
- 3. The purpose of the Club shall be to promote interest in VHF activity and improvement of existing equipment.
- 4. To help one another, join in any club sponsored event 100%.
- 5. The club shall meet once a month.
- 6. The club frequency shall be 144.2 MC. and members shall be provided with crystals.
- 7. W3IBH was appointed president and W3SAO secretary.


